The Great Leader by Jim Harrison

Jim Harrison's rough and rugged style shines through in this mystery about a Retired Michigan Police Officer's search for an elusive cult leader. While the main character Sunderson may be a former cop he is no hero. Struggles with alcoholism, loneliness and divorce plague this character as he endeavors to bring this cult leader to justice. Harrison's ability to balance a character on the edge of loved and hated reflects the complex nature of humanity. Harrison manages to write a classic noir novel but with his dry wit that makes his writing so unique. If you're looking for a gritty mystery this is the book for you.

The Giver by Lois Lowry

When I think of books I could read again and again my mind always jumps to The Giver. This book explores the concept and complexities of a dystopia better than any dystopian written for adults. Lowry manages to a world of such perfection that the reader, like the main character doesn't want to see how this world was created. Lowry discusses serious issues like freedom, individuality, principles, and human nature in a way that is accessible for readers whether teens or adults. No matter how many times you read it The Giver always has more to give.

Good-Bye Chunky Rice by Craig Thompson

Good-Bye, Chunky Rice is the story of a turtle searching for home. Now this may sound like a children's novel, but I assure you this is not a book for children. This graphic novel deals with struggles of identity, childhood trauma, disabilities, loss, and fear through the departure of Chunky Rice the turtle, his subsequent travels and those he leaves behind. Thompson uses his cartoonish character to lull the reader into a false sense of security before dealing with serious considerations of human nature. It's more serious nature makes this graphic novels great for people who have never read graphic novels before.

The Blind Assassin by Margaret Atwood

The Blind Assassin tells three stories. The stories of two sister as they each see it and the novel one of them wrote all interwoven together. Set in the 1930s the story begins with the death of Laura Chase but works from that point backwards and forwards to build the lives of Laura and her sister Iris. The Blind Assassin is a drama, a love story, a mystery, science fiction and a period piece all expertly woven together to tell the complicated story and the choices that shaped their lives.

The Thief of Always by Clive Barker

Clive Barker is a master of horror so when I saw he had a juvenile fiction graphic novel I was intrigued. He is successful in spinning a terrifying tale while keeping it appropriate for older juvenile readers. *The Thief of Always* tells the story of the holiday house. Where everyday is a different holiday and children are granted everything they wish for. A new arrival, Harvey Swick, is initially enamored by the house which seems to be every child's fantasy. But as he starts looking around the darker side of the house starts to reveal itself. *The Thief of Always* is a perfect read this Halloween season.

Star Island by Carl Hiaasen

Star Island is the story of a collapsing starlet, her body double, an overzealous paparazzo and a crazed environmentalist former governor. In true Hiaasen style this book is full of twists and turns as this cast of characters all fight to get what they want sometimes physically, but mostly through outrageous schemes. This novel does feel more like a series of unrelated incidents than his previous works which filled with seemingly small bizarre events managed to maintain a cohesive picture. That being said it is still a fun, trashy, witty, over-the-top, zany and sometimes just bizarre read.
